System of Care Board Member Description

System of Care: a framework intended to develop a broad flexible array of effective services and supports for a defined multisystem involved population, which is organized into a coordinated network, integrates care planning and care management across multiple levels, is culturally and linguistically competent, builds meaningful partnerships with families and with youth at service delivery, management and policy levels, has supportive management and policy infrastructure, and is data-driven (Pires, 2010).

- Willing to commit time for board meetings, committee meetings, planning sessions, and special events.
